Background

- Today's world is facing a series of important crises: from the unresolved climate transition to the continuation of ongoing challenges to the welcoming of migrant workers without forgetting the current conflict in Ukraine. Many Catholic Church actors and Catholic-inspired organisations (CIOs), together with other faith actors and values-based actors, are engaged toward the promotion of social justice.
- Their understanding of social justice is grounded in a holistic approach, centred on the value of the human person and its dignity, therefore extending beyond providing access to income and reducing wealth inequalities. It understands that conflict can only be resolved through organised dialogue.
- Churches, communities and grass-rooted organisations are caring for our common home. They are able to identify and raise the voice of people enduring the transformation from a marginal position and peripheries in societies and bring them to the center.

- These organisations are also already engaged in actions, projects, and processes to ensure an imaginative, innovative, peaceful and more equitable common building of our common future. They stand ready to share their existing experience and build on it to contribute to the promotion of social justice.
- This event is an opportunity for a common undertaking and a common social discernment, at the time when the Catholic Church is celebrating the 60th anniversary of the Encyclical Letter *Pacem in terris* by Saint John XXIII, and entering a synodal global reflection, when the ILO is proposing to launch a Global social justice coalition (to be finalized with other interests)

- Initiate a process of common social discernment by bringing together Catholic Church actors, Catholic-inspired organisations (CIOs), other faiths groups and value-based organisations to engage in work-related social justice.
- Agree on common values as the foundation to promote of work-related social justice.
- Identify key challenges and possible answers to promote work-related social justice.
- Share examples of effective action in this field.
- Agree on a joint statement and a roadmap for the promotion.
